BUT IT TURNS OUT YOU ARE ENTIRELY WRONG

Those who gathered in Jerusalem were pretty sure about what it all meant. Jesus, their teacher and healer was riding into Jerusalem on a donkey. His actions and his presence, were the fulfillment of the prophet's words. They had hoped he might be, and now they knew—this Jesus was the Saviour of the world. This Jesus would free them from oppression and restore their hopes and dreams. Palm Sunday brings with it an air of celebration, triumph and majesty. Using the everyday things they had with them—their cloaks and palm branches, the disciples and the gathered crowd celebrated this momentous day and the promise of salvation which Jesus represents.

And yet, days later this very same man, the one they had cheered for, believed in, trusted and celebrated was hanging on a cross. Beaten, betrayed and broken, Jesus suffered at the hands of both friend and stranger. He suffered a cruel and painful death. In desperation in the Garden of Gethsemane the night that he was betrayed Jesus asks God to take the cup of suffering from him. His agony ends when he accepts: "Father, if this can not pass...your will be done."

Your will be done. These are powerful words for us as we stay in place to save lives this Lent and Holy Week. The world which we thought we understood has been turned upside down. We find ourselves questioning all the things we thought we knew, the things we have trusted all our lives, our touchstones and routines fall away. We find ourselves needing to pray this more than ever. Your will, O God, be done. We feel fragile, fearful, vulnerable, overwhelmed by the suffering pain and challenges we see. Your will, O God, be done. Let us like the Jerusalem crowd, hold on to the promise of

God's Salvation and the hope of the triumphal entry. Let us find strength in Jesus' courage as we journey with him to the cross and wait expectantly for the Resurrection joy which is to come.

Monday

Psalm 36:5-11 / Isaiah 42:1-9 / Hebrews 9:11-15 / John 12:1-11

Breath of all that is, you are amongst us, neither quenching growth nor extinguishing light. You dwell in our midst us in Jesus, our brother. May we, like Mary, unbind our normal conventions, and greet you with extravagant, lasting gestures of love. Make our lives homes of holiness where you dwell forever. With Jesus we pray. Amen.

Tuesday

Psalm 71:1-14 / Isaiah 49:1-7 / I Corinthians 1:18-31 / John 12:20-36

Ever-loyal God, we stand empty, waiting, facing a day of not knowing what or how to believe. In this empty day, your unceasing steadfast love reminds us that your mercy does not end with death. You proclaim your good news to the living and to the dead, assuring us that love covers a multitude of sins. Even at the sealed tomb, we wait for the 'more' that is you. With Jesus we pray. Amen.

RESOURCES FOR PRAYER AND REFLECTION

This week I have reflected with a number of people about how we might pray in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. What do we ask for when there is simply so much need?

- It can help to start with prayers of thanksgiving this will help you focus on the blessings in your life right now.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ACCESSING ZOOM—YOU CAN DO IT!

If you haven't used Zoom before, we hope you will find it to be a simple enough process. The key detail is the meeting ID, which is like a virtual meeting room number – each meeting has been assigned one of these numbers (make sure you use the right number/link or you'll be in the wrong place). There's no cost. There is no need to sign up for anything, but if you want to join, you can just get a free account.

On a computer: Copy and paste this link: https://zoom.us/ and you will be taken to the Zoom website. The first time you use Zoom you will be prompted to install the software needed and you will then be taken to the meeting. Please contact Brian Tracey (details at top of page) if you need assistance. He has detailed Instructions to help you.

On a smart phone or tablet: If you want to use your smartphone/tablet – you will need to download the Zoom app. The only detail you then need is the meeting ID, listed above.

On a landline or telephone: If the technology doesn't work for you, you can phone in (we just won't be able to see you). The phone number is (09) 884 6780. When asked for a meeting ID enter the correct number from above and press the # key.

Feel free to do this now if you want to see how it all works – just note that because you're really early for the meeting, you'll be the only one there! You can then leave and come back at the right time!

AUCKLAND CITY MISSION REQUEST

Chris Farrelly, City Missioner, updated the Diocese this week on the three focus areas of the Mission's work during this lockdown period:

- caring for the homeless and finding them homes
- food for those in desperate need
- healthcare for our most vulnerable.

House the homeless

About 160 people are settled, with another 40 in motels and others in various hostel premises, but the pressure for places continues. The Government has offered the use of inner-city hostel premises which could accommodate 18 residents for three months. This new facility needs to be very well-staffed, given the high likelihood of substance addiction and mental health and cognitive behaviour issues. A team of 12 is needed for safe operation. These people should be qualified social workers or similar professionals who have demonstrated competency to work in such a service.
