Call to Worship

We regret that we have forgotten Earth and treated this garden planet as a beast to be tamed and a place to be ruled.

Christ, the hope of all creation, we lament our failings.

We have allowed disease to infect our ancient Kauri; ignored the distant sounds in the forest, the sound of chainsaws clearing for greed and gain, the sound of old-forest giants falling forever, the sound of rare species breathing their last.

Christ, the source of all life, we are sorry. We are sorry.

Christ, teach us to love Earth and return to Earth as our home.

I speak for Christ: I invite you to come home to Earth by rejoicing in the forest and the bush.
